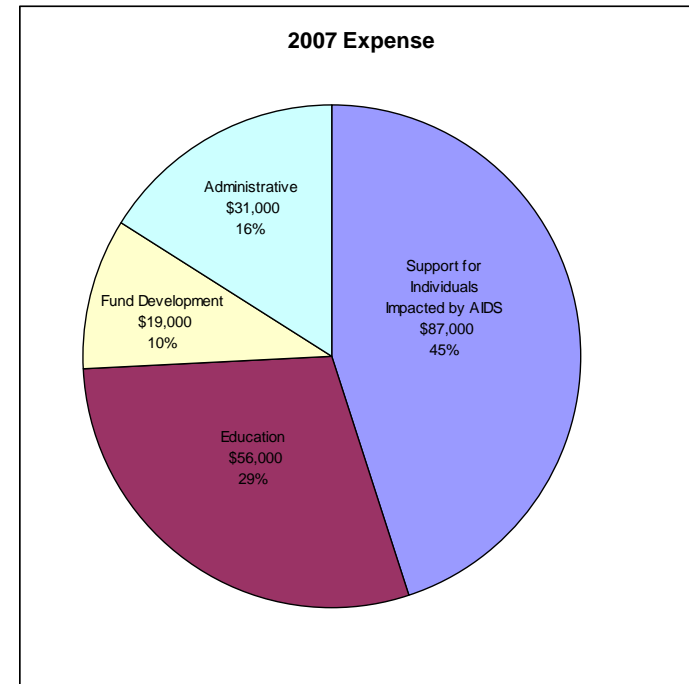
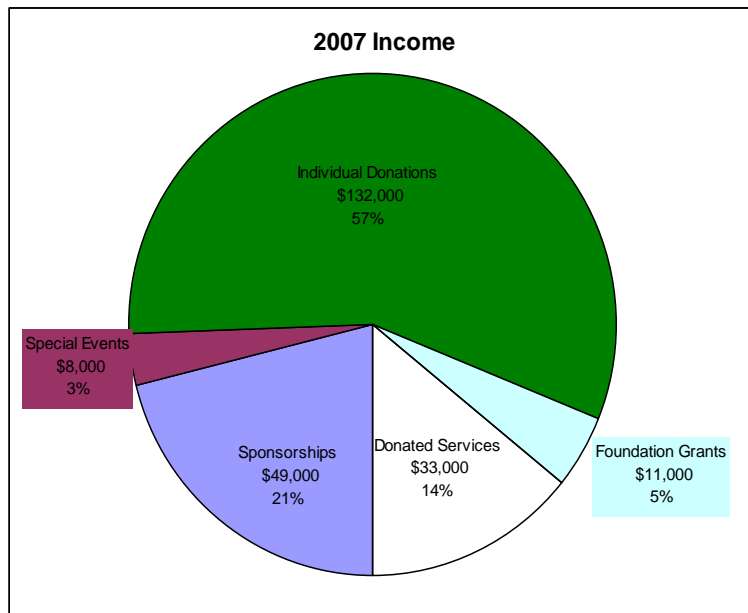


Slum Doctor Programme 2007 Annual Report



2007 Slum Doctor Programme Highlights

- 600 women were screened for cervical cancer in partnership with the Tumaini Project at the Hope Center for Infectious Diseases with the generous support of Saturna Capital
- Over 1000 high school students were presented our global AIDS curriculum during the 2007/08 academic year with the generous support of the AmeriCorps program
- SDP began working with an interdisciplinary group of Western Washington University faculty to plan a summer quarter service learning intensive for WWU students at the Ombogo Girls' Academy in 2009
- Tim Costello, our Executive Director, was a recipient of the Whatcom County Human Rights Award
- 11 of the 50 students at the Ombogo Girls' Academy graduated through the support of our scholarship program and our generous local sponsors
- We added a second daily meal to our Rabuor Village Nursery School project that feeds 160 children
- We moved to a larger office in the Old Foundry Building at 100 E. Maple St., which houses other nonprofit organizations. We were able to hire our former AmeriCorps member, Jesse Papineau, as a Program Coordinator and make room for our new AmeriCorps, Paige Lamb. Stop by we love to have visitors!
- We conducted an evaluation planning and accounting needs with our African partners and instituted a program for the Community Based Organizations to improve their capacity to communicate their missions, goals, activities, achievements and financial condition to their own members, Slum Doctor Programme and other existing and potential contributors using standard accounting principles and format.
